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Johnny Mercer loved to sing. With his charming southern accent he was a delightful rhythm singer as this compact disc will clearly attest.

From the beginning track it is apparent that Johnny is in good company and having fun. A superb jazz combo backs the singer throughout. And to add variety to the program Mercer is joined by two of his special friends: the lovely songstress *Helen O'Connell* and singer-songwriter *Bobby Troup*.

With the jazz combo simulating a train coming down the track, Johnny quickly jumps on board for a swinging singing ride On The Atchison, Topeka and the Santa Fe. A slow trombone intro changes the tempo and Mercer reprises G.I. Jive his tongue-in-cheek contribution to the war cause. A lazy mood is next created by the interplay between Johnny's voice and a bluesey guitar on his first major collaboration with Hoagy Carmichael, the easy going Lazy Bones. The first duet on the disc brings together Mercer with the pert Helen O' Connell to brighten the session with their up tempo rendition of Accentuate The Positive. Helen then solos on a rather brisk interpretation of the wonderful Mercer-Mancini collaboration, Moon River. A walking bass helps Johnny vocally court Duke Ellington's Satin Doll on a leisurely stroll. The second duet brings together the two tunesmiths, Troup and Mercer in a breezy and sporty rendition of the athletic epic Jamboree Jones. The Sweetheart Tree returns the reins on this musical journey to Johnny for a wonderful interpretation of one of his lesser known ballads. Mercer rhythmically continues in the drivers seat with the up-tempo, Somethings Gotta Give from the 1955 Fred Astaire film Daddy Long Legs. The final duet again perfectly pairs Mercer with O'Connell in a medium bounce treatment of Two Of A Kind. The haunting melody of Autumn Leaves allows Helen alone to be wonderfully reflective with one of Mercer's most lovely lyrics. The disc ends upbeat, allowing Mercer and members of the combo to stretch out on Jeepers Creepers his 1938 novelty tune from the film, Going Places.
